## Always:-



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Ensure you have the means to travel- a valid ticket/pass or the correct change. Most buses will not give out change





Ensure you are the only person to hear your music

Pick up all your litter & have respect for property

Respect other passengers' property and space

Use language which can offend

Smoke (including vaping and e-cigarettes), take drugs or drink alcohol on public transport or their premises

Behave in a way considered anti-social e.g. no fighting, shouting, swearing, spitting, graffiti etc.

Push or rush towards the bus/train/tram when it arrives- you may push someone into the path of the moving vehicle. Only board the vehicle once it has stopped and the doors opened. Let other passengers exit before attempting to board

Put your feet on seats or vandalise public transport property

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Commit any crime that affects our services, passengers, staff or property

Be abusive towards staff or passengers

Bad behaviour aboard public transport gives the wrong impression of your school to other passengers and your community. It also discourages others from using public transport.

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## SAFER BEHAVIOUR, SAFER TRANSPORT, SAFER TRAVEL

West Midlands Police, British Transport Police, Transport for West Midlands and Transport Operators make up the Safer Travel Partnership, which exists to make public transport in the West Midlands even safer by reducing anti-social behaviour (ASB) and promoting safer travel, responsible and respectful behaviour across the West Midlands public transport network.

To promote responsible and respectful behaviour, in conjunction with our partner organisations, we have created a **Passenger Code of Conduct**, to re-enforce our expectations of acceptable behaviour when travelling by bus, train or tram. When travelling in their uniform students are representing their school and bad behaviour aboard public transport gives the wrong impression to other passengers and your community. It also discourages others from using public transport. Students should be able to travel without having concerns for their own safety and we go through personal safety, making responsible decisions and also getting them to report anything that worries them when they travel.

To support the **Passenger Code of Conduct**, it would be great to be able to visit your school/college and speak to students about travelling safely and ASB, perhaps as part of an enrichment or PSHE day? Presentations can be in a classroom session or an assembly. These sessions have worked really well in getting students to think about their actions, the effect on other passengers and also to prevent low level incidents turning into something serious along with keeping themselves safe and knowing how to report anything that concerns them.
